It takes a collaborative effort to keep students motivated about their education, one that must have support from family, community and the education system. Taking place from February 10th-14th this year, Hooked on School Days (also called Perseverance Week), is a time designated to fuel this effort across Québec as well as from within the Western Québec School Board's schools and centres.

Hooked on School Days (HSD) is an event that began on February 21st, 2005, thanks to Réussite Montérégie, a Regional Consulting Authority (RCA) school perseverance. HSD began in the Montérégie region but has since spread to become a Québec-wide event.

Currently, it is organized by 18 RCAs, who mobilize hundreds of local organizations around the importance of actions that make a difference in the academic success of all students, from pre-schoolers to young adults. These organizations host a variety of regional activities to encourage perseverance at schools and throughout the broader community across Québec.

This year, several of the WQSB's elementary schools have organized activities for Hooked on School Days. At South Hull Elementary, the entire student body went for a walk through their neighborhood and down a local forested path.

Principal Erick Tremblay believes HSD helps prepare students for their future by building self-confidence and nurturing a growth mindset. "Young people learn that effort and perseverance are more important than talent alone. This encourages them to see mistakes as learning opportunities rather than failures."



G.Theberge Ski/Board Club travels to Blue Mountain Resort





Using Concept Circles for Deeper Understanding in Mathematics





A Concept Circle is a graphic organizer that is being explored in mathematics classrooms across the Western Quebec School Board with exciting results.

At Queen Elizabeth Elementary School, Tracy Hodgson-Drysdale's Grade 1 class used Concept Circles to study number flexibility by making 10s. The students matched coloured tokens in ten frames to build expressions of 10 (9+1, 5+5 etc.). They had a blast with lots of counting and combinations! Students later played Go-Fish for 10 to apply their knowledge in a meaningful context.

At **Poltimore Elementary School**, Petya Karakoleva's Cycle 3 students tackled decimals using base-10 blocks. Sticky notes were scattered across the Concept Circle. The purpose? To ask for the appropriate representation, given a flat is equal to one. This hands-on challenge helped students make sense of an abstract concept.

Concept Circles work in geometry lessons, too. Back at **Queen Elizabeth Elementary School**, Jennifer Robertson's Cycle 2 class used Concept Circles to build and deconstruct shapes with pattern blocks. Students made the shape repeatedly with a different number of blocks each time. Lightbulb moments, pride and brain cells were firing as students engaged and persisted in problem solving.

Even assessment is getting a fresh twist. At **Greater Gatineau Elementary School**, Cycle 3 teachers Stephanie Stone and Michael Birch co-created a Concept Circle assessment, allowing students to demonstrate their understanding as an alternative to traditional question and answer tests.

Concept Circles are versatile and suitable for K4-Sec 5. The strategy engages students socially and cognitively with endless instructional possibilities. To learn more or try them in your classroom contact Jeff Harvey, WQSB Mathematics Consultant (jharvey@wqsb.qc.ca).

Suicide Prevention Week: Promoting Awareness and Support in WQSB High Schools

Suicide Prevention Week is a time for high schools in our board to raise awareness, provide resources, and create a supportive environment for students struggling with mental health challenges. By fostering open conversations and reducing stigma, schools can play a vital role in preventing suicide and promoting emotional well-being.

During the week, events such as awareness activities, peer support groups, and guest speaker presentations take place.



To help educate students about warning signs and provide coping strategies.

Schools may also set up resource booths with information on counseling services, crisis hotlines, and stress management techniques. Encouraging students to check in on their peers and seek help when needed can make a significant impact.

Some examples of activities that took place in our schools were A Wellness Wall, where students could express what brings them joy, a coping strategy tool kit as well as shining light on things that bring them hope.

Students were encouraged to add their experiences to the wall. Another school held a lunch where students were given strategies to help cope with mental health challenges. The school also provided announcements throughout the week that broke down myths about suicide, provided facts and helplines for students to access.

By prioritizing mental health education and fostering a safe, open environment, our schools can empower students to support one another and seek help when needed. Suicide Prevention Week is more than just a series of events—it's a commitment to ongoing mental health awareness and support.

The services offered by the youth mental health team are targeted at youths under 18 experiencing mild to moderate mental problems, affecting their functioning and development.


Centre of Excellence for Mental Health



Seniority List: Accuracy and Transparency



The HR department has recently distributed the teacher seniority list as of June 30, 2024, ensuring transparency and accuracy in rankings.

What is the Seniority List?

It records each teacher's years of service with the school board, used to determine entitlements as per the Collective Agreement (Clause 5-2.00 SENIORITY).

Where to Find the List:

- An email from HR with the list.
- A printed copy is posted in your school's staff room.

Next Steps:

If you have concerns about your seniority, submit corrections to WQTA by April 11, 2025. The board will respond after reviewing all inquiries.

Teacher Information Sheets: What They Are and Why They Matter



The WQSB has mailed Teacher Information Sheets to all teachers. These annual documents outline key employment details as per the local agreement with the Western Québec Teachers' Association (WQTA).

What's Included:

- Basis of employment (part-time, full-time, replacement)
- Teaching category
- Experience, scholarity, classification
- Salary, seniority, tenure, employment status
- Workload percentage
- Explanation of pay stub codes (in English and French)

Why It Matters:

These details ensure transparency. If any discrepancies are found, teachers should promptly contact HR.



From a young age, this little girl knew she wanted to help people. It was in her nature and it was no surprise to anyone who knew her when she was drawn to the vocation of teaching. She began working in different schools



across the Western Québec School Board, first as an elementary school French teacher. In this role, she had a gift for connecting with and motivating reluctant learners to engage in a beautiful second language. She also worked as a resource teacher, helping struggling students acquire strategies for greater academic success.


Throughout her teaching career, she felt drawn to technology and had a knack for integrating ICT into lessons. She became the "go to person" in school when people were experiencing difficulty with technology. More importantly, she enjoyed helping colleagues develop their competency in this area and hey began gravitating to her because of the excellent support she provided them.

She eventually found her next calling as a RECIT consultant, assisting teachers and administrators across the WQSB at a crucial time when educational innovation was booming. 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
